Summer Greetings!

Summer is a great time for a change of pace. Though activity has slowed, we at church are busy planning for the fall, getting committees in place and preparing schedules for classes. These things don't just happen! Planning ahead helps keep surprises to a minimum and gives time for all the pieces to come together. That being said, we take time to listen to the leading of the Holy Spirit, and if we are faithful to that guidance, ministry will indeed happen in wonderful ways.

As I begin my twenty-fifth year at White Memorial, I want to thank all who continue to help ministry happen in so many different ways. You are so generous with your time, talents and resources. Because of you, people near and far are fed, housed and clothed. Each of us is called to help where we can, and it multiplies when we work together. We have an Outreach Committee that oversees local and international ministry. This committee has over-sight of 30% of the church's budget which allows us to work with Habitat for Humanity, Step-Up, provide grants to almost 40 local agencies, do service projects, build schools in Haiti, work with summer camps in Russia and so much more. Know that the Outreach Committee takes stewardship seriously and makes sure each dollar is well spent.

We have long-standing relationships with many ministries and agencies because of mutual mission focus and church member interest and involvement, and we are open to new outreach opportunities when they present themselves. We try to make sure each opportunity fits with WMPC's mission and place within the community. Our website and newsletter provide information on how to be involved in outreach. Please take time to read that information and get involved as you are able.

On another note, I have recently returned from a two-week faith-based tour of Germany focused on the Reformation. It was fascinating to hear the stories of Martin Luther and those who supported him in his bold new ideas of reforming the church. We started our tour in Berlin and ended in Munich, visiting many sites of Reformation importance along the way. Martin Luther was fortunate to have the support of several rulers who protected him from those who wanted to silence this new movement.

The invention of the printing press was key in spreading these new ideas. We visited the Gutenberg Museum, where two of the first Bibles printed by press were on display. There were 80 Bibles originally printed with this new method. It took three years! Each letter of the alphabet had to be made by hand and then each page set up with the letters facing backward so they would face the correct way when printed. It was a tedious process to make the printed page, but in the long run, it was able to speed up the bookmaking process. Before the printing press, one person worked for three years to produce just one copy by hand. So at least they could print 80 times as many Bibles in the three-year process thanks to the printing process.

This is the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, so take an opportunity to hear the stories and learn about those who put their lives on the line for what they believed to be right. There were many who lost their lives going against the teachings of the church of their time, so, yes, it is a big deal. This Reformation, with the help of the printing press and the Renaissance that was happening in other parts of the world, was the end of the Middle Ages. A whole new way of thinking was taking shape that would affect the way the world saw things.

Our Presbyterian faith is a product of that time, and while the Reformation gave it birth, our church continues reforming with the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

From the Caldwell Library: two books providing insight on dyslexia.

Dyslexia is "a neurological disorder that impairs reading." An estimated 13 million students in the United States have dyslexia.

The Caldwell Library has two excellent books, published recently, that help readers gain insight into what this disorder means to those who have it. Both are accessible to readers from elementary school age to adults. One is by a church member. For adults and young people, these are good resources.

White Memorial member Aidan Colvin, son of Liisa Ogburn and Gregg Colvin, has dyslexia. He writes, "If you're like me, reading or having to handwrite something is like running a race as a double amputee." After his ninth-grade year, Aidan decided to write letters to 100 individuals who had dyslexia but had become successful. He asked them several questions. A significant number replied. Aidan's book, *Looking for Heroes: One Year, One Boy, 100 Letters* (371.9 Col), written with the help of his mother, was published in 2016. Aidan is an engaging writer and young person. His book will help any reader gain insight into the challenges of dyslexia.





Fish in a Tree (J F Hun) is a novel on many lists of good reads for elementary-age readers. The main character, Ally, enters the sixth grade unable to read and is classified as "dumb." At the end of the second chapter, Ally says, "No matter how many times I have prayed and worked and hoped, reading for me is still like trying to make sense of a can of alphabet soup that's been dumped on a plate."

For those who do not have dyslexia, these two books are eye-opening.
