Lessons from the Old Dominion

Driving from Raleigh to Charlottesville is really quite easy. One begins on Interstate 40 to Efland. Next, one takes Highway 86 to Danville, Virginia. Finally, Highway 29 leads beyond Lynchburg, Natural Bridge, through the hamlet of Colleen (one of my favorite little places in the United States) and then into Charlottesville. My wife, Colleen, holds a graduate degree from the University of Virginia. We took our family to Monticello several years ago in an attempt to help them learn to love their country and its history. Charlottesville is close. I'd be willing to bet everyone reading this letter has either been to Charlottesville or knows someone who has visited or lived there.

At the end of last week, the bottom dropped out as groups with racist ideologies congregated in Charlottesville. Charlottesville became ground zero. And once again, our beautiful nation is left with the somber task of examining its soul as it wrestles with the sad and tragic legacies of racism in all its ugly forms.

An important historical debate in Charlottesville became an occasion for abuse for those who would promote racial supremacy and actively dig up ideologies from the shameful past of Jim Crow, the KKK, and the Nazi regime. Like you, I saw many quotes over the weekend about Charlottesville. The one quote that stuck with me most was from Senator Orin Hatch of Utah: "We should call evil by its name. My brother didn't give his life fighting Hitler for Nazi ideas to go unchallenged here at home." His quote made me think of my grandfather, who risked his life in the Navy so our nation could not only be free but would be compassionate and fair and just as well.

Do any of us really need a pastor, a religious authority, a judge or an elected official to say that racism and bigotry are wrong? As Grier said in her sermon, the gospel stands in opposition to the virus of bigotry. There is no room in the gospel for racial hatred. There is no room in the gospel for racial supremacy. There is no moral difference between a terrorist from the Middle East who drives a murderous truck through Marseille, one from Kansas City who murders police officers in Baton Rouge, or one from Ohio who drives a murderous sedan through Charlottesville. As followers of Jesus, we are not required to agree on every single point or policy. But we are required to pray. We are required to name evil as it rears its head. We are required to long for a day when discrimination is but a memory. We are required to seek justice, love kindness and walk humbly before God as we, the children of God, work for the day when the nations of the world stream to God's holy mountain.

May justice seeking grace abound,
